The Season of Advent

The Advent season is a time of preparation that directs our hearts and minds to Christ's second coming at the end of time and to the anniversary of Our Lord's birth on Christmas. People have always been fascinated by Jesus's promise to return. But scripture during Advent tells us not to waste time with predictions. Advent is not about speculation. Advent readings call us to be alert and ready, not distracted by this world (Lk 21:34-36). Like Lent, the liturgical color for Advent is purple since both seasons prepare us for great feast days. Advent also includes an element of penance to prepare, quiet, and discipline our hearts for the full joy of Christmas.

The final days of Advent, from December 17 to 24, we focus on our preparation for the celebrations of the Nativity of our Lord at Christmas. In particular, the "O" Antiphons are sung during this period and have been by the Church since at least the Eighth Century. They use ancient biblical imagery drawn from the messianic hopes of the Old Testament to proclaim the coming of Christ as the fulfillment not only of Old Testament hopes, but of present ones as well.

Advent devotions including the Advent wreath, remind us of the meaning of the season. You are encouraged to enter into the season intentionally with daily activity and prayer to prepare spiritually for the birth of Jesus Christ.

Be Vigilant Luke 21:25-28, 34-36

Today is the first Sunday of Advent, which also begins the new liturgical year. Advent includes the four Sundays that precede Christmas. It is a time to prepare for the coming of the Lord. In this season, we recall two central elements of our faith: the final coming of the Lord in glory and the incarnation of the Lord in the birth of Jesus. The key themes of the Advent season are watchful waiting, preparation, and justice.

The Gospel of Luke is the primary Gospel proclaimed this liturgical year (Lectionary Cycle C). Today we hear Jesus speak to His disciples about vigilance and prayer as they wait for the coming of the Son of Man in glory. This passage marks the conclusion of a dialogue in which Jesus predicts the destruction of the Temple in Jerusalem, warns about the persecution and tribulations to follow, and identifies the signs that will signal the coming of the Son of Man in glory.

The community for whom Luke wrote his Gospel may have believed that they were experiencing some of the events Jesus described. Most scholars believe that Luke's Gospel was written after the destruction of Jerusalem by the Romans in 70 AD. At the time, many Christians interpreted this event as an indication that Jesus's second coming was near.

Though Jesus predicts a time of destruction and fear, Jesus indicates that His disciples are not to fear, but should stand tall. Even so, Jesus does not promise deliverance from anxiety or trouble. He encourages His disciples to pray for strength. The early Christian communities did not find consolation in the promise of a utopia, nor should we. As the faithful, we are witness to God's unfailing love in all circumstances.

Jesus's predictions about the end times may sound dire, but in His person and in His message, those who heard Jesus found strength and consolation. Like the first Christians, we may encounter circumstances that could lead to despair. Through prayer however, we find strength and consolation in Jesus's words and in His continuing presence with us to endure all things. We are present day witnesses to the action of God in our world.
