Competing Views of the Human Person

Dominant Secular View

Frequently, but mistakenly, presumed to be true.

Often taught as if "proven."

VS

Catholic Christian View

Explained in the Catechism of the Catholic Church. Rooted in Scripture, Tradition, and Church Teaching.

I am my mind.

I am a self-defining being. I must decide what it means to be me. I have no given "nature" to direct or limit my free choices.

The natural world is a vast organic reality with its own natural order. Humans increasingly respect this natural order and reject its exploitation.

My body is an amazing machine which I am entitled to use as I please. There is no plan for my life other than the one I make.

I am free to determine my own identity. Receiving my identity from another threatens my autonomy. I am my soul and my body.

I am a creature: My nature as a human person is the intentional gift of God, who is good and who has loved me into existence as the person I am.

I am part of creation. I view the natural world, including myself, as having an order that must be respected.

My body is designed by God and helps me to understand God's plan for my life.

My primary identity is that of a son or daughter of God. That is who I am.
