#### THINGS ABOVE FROM FR. BILOT

In today's American culture, when someone hears the word "retreat" one may think of a business trip "desert" (retreat) to step back from active ministry to where the group of employees come together to bond, to spend time with the Lord. I went to the Monastery of create alliances and working relationships in hopes of furthering the mission of the company. The relationships formed are not necessarily to create community but to support the bottom line.

Before the United States existed, for centuries the word "retreat" was referenced. A retreat, in the context for which I am using it is actually the third definition in the good ole' Webster dictionary. It says – retreat: "a period of group withdrawal for prayer, meditation, study, or instruction under a director." Thus it is easy to see how a corporation or business can also use the word to define an activity it demands of its employees. The business retreat is not used to forge relationships that lead to our relationship with Jesus. Can you imagine if a company retreat was formed to develop relationships to further the mission of the Kingdom?

Since the time of Jesus and the keys given to Peter to form the Catholic Church people have gone on retreat, modeling the time of solitude after Jesus who went away by himself to be one with the Father. Thus for centuries men and women – priests, religious and lay have stepped out of the normal routine, like Jesus, to take time to deepen their relationship with God. The goal of the retreat is to forge a deeper and beautiful bond with Jesus Christ, His Mother Mary and the Saints.

Canon Law of the Catholic Church under the section of priestly ministry states that a priest should take a yearly retreat. The Church in its wisdom knows that even though a priest is asked to do a Holy Hour each day, pray 5 of the 7 hours of the Breviary and daily Mass, the time away and alone with Jesus allows for a quality relationship to deepen, allowing the Holy Spirit to renew us, challenge us and as I put it "fill me up" so that I can be a better servant of the Lord.

A couple of weeks ago I forged into the the Holy Angels in Hanceville, AL. They have a clergy retreat center on the grounds of the Shrine. I enjoy the location, for it is out in the country and the retreat center is comfortable with a beautiful chapel. There is also the Shrine church that has daily exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, a Lourdes shrine, and a river to sit by and ponder. Normally, I take a retreat after Easter but this year scheduling altered my plans. Being in Alabama in June was definitely warmer with 100% humidity.

Retreat consists of daily Mass, three or four holy hours, walks, rosary and sleep. Time goes by quickly. I am grateful to have the opportunity to attend a yearly retreat to deepen my relationship with the Lord and hopefully, to be a better priest for His Church.

I was reminding my brother Rick, on Father's Day, that 29 years ago, on a Saturday morning, he spent three hours in Church, experiencing his brother (me) being ordained a Catholic priest. (That was probably the longest he and the rest of my family ever spent in church at one time!!) He and I just wonder how the years could pass so quickly. We were actually talking about this at his daughter's home, who is now married with two children. She was two years old when I was ordained!

I am grateful to be a priest. It is a blessed life. And because of the priesthood I am able to be here at St. Paul following in a historical lineage of priests who have served over the past century. Please pray for vocations to the priesthood and religious life.


In this book Fr. D'Elbee presents the spirituality of St. Therese of Lisieux in a simple and profound manner. An excerpt: p189-190

# WITH GRATITUDE FOR AFRICAN-AMERICAN CATHOLICS

#### Michigan Catholic Conference

United States history includes a wealth of inspirational African-American men and women.

Sojourner Truth, Frederick Douglass, Harriet Tubman, Booker T. Washington, Rosa Parks, Jackie Robinson, and

Martin Luther King Jr. are well known examples in the fight for equality and justice.



There are also many individuals in the Catholic tradition who have contributed significantly to racial equality and improving civic life in American communities. Henriette Delille, a free woman of color in the 1800s, created a religious order to serve those who were enslaved. Fr. Augustus Tolton, he himself a former slave, faced hostility and discrimination during his own journey into the priesthood. Mother Mary Lange, the founder of the Oblate Sisters of Providence, created a free school in her home for African-American children since one was not otherwise available. For today's generation, these Black men and women demonstrate the importance of perseverance and hope amid intolerance and ignorance.

The Catholic Church strongly condemns racism. It is a sin against the dignity of the human person and has no place in the Church. According to the U.S. bishops, racism arises when:

"Either consciously or unconsciously—a person holds that his or her own race or ethnicity is superior, and therefore judges persons of other races or ethnicities as inferior and unworthy of equal regard. When this conviction or attitude leads individuals or groups to exclude, ridicule, mistreat, or unjustly discriminate against per- sons on the basis of their race or ethnicity, it is sinful...[it reveals] a failure to acknowledge the human dignity of the persons offended."

Sadly, racism has harmed individuals of every ethnicity in society, and it has been carried out by those of differing races. In particular, generational and institutional racism has plagued varying ethnicities, impacting Native American, Latino, and Black families who have especially felt the effects of personal and institutional prejudices. The lingering discrimination is clearly visible in various areas of society, including education, employment, criminal jus-tice, and housing. Regrettably, violence and racist actions against Asian Americans are also on the rise these days.

In recent months, conversations about race and in-justice haven taken place across the nation. In particular, the murder of George Floyd in May 2020 and his words "I can't breathe" reverberated across America. Protests broke out nationwide shortly afterward, forcing communities to evaluate the status of race relations within the country. The U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops called the killing of Mr. Floyd "senseless and brutal, a sin that cries out to heaven for justice.

Although important strides toward equality have been made in years past, it is important to recognize the ongoing challenges facing the Black and broader minority com-munities today. In 2018, the Catholic bishops in the United States wrote in their pastoral letter Open Wide Our Hearts—The Enduring Call to Love, that "we all need to take responsibility for correcting the injustices of racism and healing the harms it has caused." It is impossible to address the full history of racism, particularly against the Black community, in one publication. Recognizing that reality, focus seeks to offer opportunities for reflection, ideas for advocacy action, stories of inspirational Black Catholics who enrich our faith, and additional resources to combat the ignorance and sin of racism.





# Belated Father's Day Wishes for St. Joseph

Some of you may be aware that Pope Francis declared this year to be the year of St. Joseph. Devotion to Jesus's earthly father is actually relatively new within the life of the Church, but it has been rapidly on the rise in the past century or so. In the early church St. Joseph did not receive a lot of attention for two reasons. 1.) The great saints of the early Church were incredibly devoted to reading Scripture, and St. Joseph plays a very small role in the Scriptures. He is mentioned and his actions are recorded, but never does Scripture actually record any of his *words* – he has no lines in the Bible! 2.) Some figures throughout Church history have thought that in order to defend the doctrine of Mary's perpetual virginity it was necessary to portray Joseph as an old and feeble man. This wrong idea was supported by scenes from "false Gospels" – fantastical accounts of the life of Jesus written centuries after the fact which we now know to be completely made-up.

Devotion to the figure of St. Joseph first sprung up in Medieval and Post-Reformation times with such figures as St. Theresa of Avila. But even then, this devotion was mainly present only amongst a small number of religious persons; it did not really spread to the laity until the 19<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup> centuries. One great popularizer of devotion to St. Joseph was actually the late and great Fulton Sheen, who protested strongly against the image of an old and infirm Joseph. He argued that the most fit spouse for the Mother of God was not someone who would preserve her virginity only because of the breakdown of his own body, but rather someone who was young and vigorous but would preserve Mary because of the willingness to sacrifice, the chastity, and the sanctity present in his own heart. Besides, Joseph had to be able to protect Mary, and to make several trips by foot to and from places such as Egypt and Bethlehem. Fulton Sheen's arguments have prevailed upon the Church, and today we picture Joseph as a robust man in his prime.

In 2020, a book called *Consecration to St. Joseph: The Wonders of Our Spiritual Father* was published by Fr. Donald Calloway. This book introduced many readers to the tradition that has sprung up around St. Joseph, and guided them in making a personal consecration to him. I read this book during the early months of COVID quarantining and I consecrated myself to St. Joseph on May 1<sup>st</sup> 2020, which was both my birthday and the feast of St. Joseph the Worker.

So, when Pope Francis declared 2021 to be the year of St. Joseph, it was really a culminating moment for the growth of the devotion to this great saint. God has a way of calling the attention of the Church to a particular doctrine or a particular saint at times when His providence thinks it is most appropriate to do so. It is quite reasonable, then, to think that St. Joseph has a unique role to play, and a unique lesson to teach, to our own contemporary times.



The Solemnity of St. Joseph falls on May 25<sup>th</sup>, which fell on a Friday during Lent this past year. But, according to Church law, a solemnity (the highest rank of feast on the Church's calendar) trumps a fasting day, and so for that particular Friday, even though it was Lent, we could eat meat! So naturally, at my seminary we celebrated the Feast-Day-of-Joseph-during-the-year-of Joseph-on-a-Friday-in-Lent by throwing an enormous barbeque! Below is a picture of yours truly manning the grill!

Devotion to St. Joseph has come to mean a lot in my life during this past year. I feel like I have benefited greatly from his spiritual fatherhood even since I made my consecration to him. Therefore, you can imagine my horror when it was late in the day on Father's Day this past week and I realized that I had completely forgotten to make any sort of special prayer to St. Joseph! In fact, until that moment, I had not thought about it as being his special day at all! I rectified that error immediately, but it made me think: I bet I was not the only one who forgot about St. Joseph on Father's Day. So I wanted to issue a general reminder: St. Joseph is your spiritual father, and divine providence has appointed him as a uniquely powerful saint for our current times. We ought to take advantage of that and set aside some time to pray to our spiritual father and ask for his intercession. Men especially should do this, particularly those who are fathers themselves! You might even think about ordering that book I mentioned, you will learn a lot about St. Joseph and his miraculous appearances throughout history (like when he seems to have miraculously built a staircase for an order of nuns in New Mexico!), I promise I am not making commission on it, by the way. In any case, for anyone who forgot, like me, I am sure that St. Joseph would be very happy to receive some belated Happy Father's day wishes!




# Learning How to Pray

### When can I register?

## Who can register?

#### When are classes offered?

Classes will be **in person** on Mondays, beginning October 4, 2021. Class times are 4:15 - 5:30 p.m. or 6:30 - 7:45 p.m.

### How do I register my child for Religious Education?

Registration is only offered on-line. If you need assistance, please contact the Religious Education Office at 313-885-7022.

## How do I pay?

Payment is made at the time of registration through Faith Direct.

## What is the tuition for Religious Education?

One child – \$250.00, two children – \$360.00, three children – \$425.00, four or more children – \$465.00

## Is there anything else I need to register my child?

A Baptismal Certificate or Profession of Faith is required prior to receiving the Sacraments of First Reconciliation, First Holy Communion and Confirmation. If you are registering a child for 2nd, 7th or 8th grade, please provide a copy of your child's Baptismal Certificate to the Religious Education Office. If your child was baptized at St. Paul on the Lake, you can Request Sacramental Records and the Parish Office will provide a copy to our office. A Medical Release Treatment Form is required to be on file for each child enrolled in our program.

#### I cannot afford the fee. What should I do?

It is our desire that every child in the St. Paul parish family has access to Religious Education. If the registration fees impose a financial hardship, please contact the Religious Education Office.



# Preserving a Legacy of Holiness, Beauty: St. Paul on the Lake Creates Historic Preservation Fund

St. Paul on the Lake Catholic Church has survived many crises since the church was dedicated in 1897. Throughout its remarkable history, this Grosse Pointe Farms parish has, time and again, rebuilt what was damaged and restored what was lost. Dedicated clergy and loyal parishioners devoted themselves to preserving St. Paul's historic and beautiful church campus.

"It's become clear that we need to plan for the long term if St. Paul's is to preserve its beauty and historic character," Fr. Jim said.

Angela Moloney, president of the Catholic Foundation of Michigan, said St. Paul's contacted the Foundation to help create a preservation fund. "St. Paul's is such a jewel; it's our privilege to share in this effort."

Ms. Moloney explained that one benefit of the endowment is that people can designate the fund in their wills, as well as make gifts during their lifetimes. Endowment funds are administered by the Foundation, which will make annual distributions to the parish, starting in 2022. All funds administered by the Catholic Foundation of Michigan are subject to moral and ethical screens to ensure that they are invested in a manner consistent with Church teaching.

Patrick Fabian, the parish's Business Manager, noted that the fund will establish a stable source of funding for the preservation and upkeep of the historic buildings and

grounds at St. Paul's. "We have a responsibility to see that this church we love is cared for," he said.

Monsignor Patrick Halfpenny, St. Paul's pastor from 2003-2019, used to say that the church walls are soaked in prayer. That's a legacy that St. Paul's wants to preserve for the next 120 years and beyond.
