THINGS ABOVE FROM FR. BILOT

BLESSINGS ON THIS INDEPENDENCE WEEKEND!

As a nation we celebrate Independence Day, more commonly known as the 4th of July. We have celebrated this day since 1941 but its roots go back to the 18th century and the gluttony, wrath, and sloth). The deadly sins, which move us to American Revolution. On July 2, 1776, the Continental Congress voted in favor of independence. Two days later delegates from the colonies adopted the Declaration of Independence. So, from 1776 to this day our nation celebrates its birth of independence.

The words "independence" or "freedom" have multiple levels of definition. How I use the word freedom or independence can be totally different than how you perceive or define the words, and ultimately how

you or I live by them.

Unfortunately, many people,

especially in our western culture, believe freedom means entitlement. individualism, and relativism. "I am free to do what I want, when I want, and how I want..." True, that is a definition of freedom and independence. However, that is not the way of God, who is the giver of freedom. God's freedom is the desire for our soul to be independent so we can grasp the deep and mysterious ways of the Holy Spirit. We must be reminded that God's law, more appropriately, God's covenant with us, speaks of true freedom.

I believe that our definition of freedom/independence must derive from our faith and relationship with Jesus Christ. It is only in our Catholic beliefs that we are truly free. For example, in John 8:32, "The truth will set us free". St. Paul states, "Now the Lord is the Spirit, and where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is freedom." (2 Cor3:17) and "For freedom Christ has set us free; so stand firm and do not submit again to the yoke of slavery." (Gal 5:1). The book of James teaches us, "So speak and so act as people who will be judged by the law of freedom." (James 2:12)

Freedom is not about what we want or need but about the truth. Not our truth but God's truth, which is given to us through the outpouring of the Holy Spirit in the gift of wisdom. St. Paul affirms this by telling us that the Spirit of the sets us free and gives us the Lord, who if we allow Him to guide our lives, will lead us to freedom. St. James reminds us that we should desire to be judged by the Father, who judges in truth, in freeing the soul from evil and death.

We were not created for slavery – which manifests itself in the seven deadly sins (pride, greed, lust, envy, all other sin, pulls us out of a covenant with Jesus. The Devil would say that engaging in these behaviors (sin) allows us to be free. The consequence is that sin enslaves us to our passions taking away our freedom. How does sin take away our freedom? We cannot have faith, hope and love if we are freely engaging in sin.

We were created for love. Love cannot be forced or taken or bought. Love is freedom; for we freely receive it and

> freely give it. When we love ourselves selfishly, we end up frustrated. Only genuine love can fulfill us. Freedom for its own sake will not make us free. Independence, without love and community, is being dependent on the evil one to satisfy our need for freedom. If we follow our sinful passions and thoughts, we allow the evil one to take away our freedom.

Only self-giving love can satisfy us and there is no love without freedom. Without freedom there is nothing to hope for and our faith fades away. If faith fades away our soul is vulnerable to the lies of independence, which leads to destruction.

As we celebrate our Independence as a nation, I believe it is best to step back and look at our covenant with Jesus Christ. We look at our relationship with God to find our independence and freedom. Jesus set us free by conquering the devil, its sin and death, by dying and rising for us. Only when we reflect and embrace our relationship with God in Jesus Christ, who gives us freedom, can we truly be free as an individual and as a nation!

Please note, Monday July 5th is the official national holiday. We will have one Mass at 9 a.m. in the Church. Please come and pray for our freedom - to live in the life of God, who truly independence to love with all our hearts!




Learning How to Pray

Hello everyone, it is Jeremy Schupbach, the parish seminarian. I want to invite you to join me for the project that I am most excited about undertaking this summer, and that is a four-week study on how to pray. I have always been deeply passionate about the subject of prayer; it's how God broke into my life and confirmed the vocation of the priesthood in my heart. I am convinced that prayer is the *missing puzzle-piece to our life as Christians*. At times we have all felt like there is a disparity between the way we *talk* as Christians and the actual *experience* we have of our relationship with God. I suggest that prayer is the way to overcome that gap, the way that God wants to go beyond our heads and engage our hearts in a powerful and felt manner! But it isn't easy, and you may have tried before and given up, understandably so. I'd like to help you navigate the difficulties and experience the riches for yourself! Please consider joining me and giving prayer, and God, a chance to impact your life!

<u>Details:</u> The series will be held on the four Wednesdays of July: the 7th, the 14th, the 21st, and the 28th at 6:30 pm in the Canfield Center in the school. Each session will be one hour long, I will speak for about 45 minutes and then take time to answer questions. The talks will also be available live-streamed on the parish website.

I am sure that all of you – just like me – are still reeling from the crazy parties that we all threw for St. Irenaeus this past week! Man, what a time! After all, what good Catholic does not know, revere, and celebrate St. Irenaeus with reckless abandon?

To those of you at home saying, "Saint Irewho?", and wondering if you missed a good party, don't worry, I am only being sarcastic! St. Irenaeus (pronounced "ear – uh – nay – us") is a fairly obscure name nowadays, but, in the early Church he was a really big deal, and his feast day was this past week (June 28th).

I am a big fan of St. Irenaeus because of a book that I read called *Deification and Grace* by Dr. Daniel Keating, one of my seminary professors. *Deification and Grace* examines the historical development of the Catholic doctrine of deification. "Deification" refers to what will happen to us if we make it to heaven, as well as what *began* to happen when we got baptized. It means that we will be, and in some sense *are*, inserted directly into the life of the Trinity – the life that makes God "God" – and we are inserted to such an extent that we can be called gods ourselves! Or, more exactly, we will *participate* in God's divinity. God will elevate us so greatly that, as one theologian boldly put it, we will have a certain equality with God, so that we may truly have friendship with Him.

Now, that sounds ridiculous, but that's kind of the point. The doctrine of deification is supposed to shock us out of our humdrum conceptions of the afterlife. Many think of heaven as "The Great Golf Course in the Sky," but that way of thinking limits heaven to a surplus of the pleasures we are used to on earth. Deification, however, reminds us that our eternal destiny is as much greater than our ideas of heaven as God is greater than man! It is also meant to shock us out of our humdrum conceptions of the sacraments, especially Baptism, for in them this process is initiated.

The best part, though, is that the shock value isn't just shock value, it is true. If the doctrine of deification is shocking it is because *God's Revelation is supposed to shock us*, and deification is just one of the most shocking parts of it! Personally, meditating on these ideas has borne a tremendous amount of fruit in my spiritual life. It helps me to see just how big the "big picture" is, and, with eternity in mind, to not hold on so tightly to reality as we know it.


But what does that have to do with St. Irenaeus? Dr. Keating's book argues that the doctrine has its first rudimentary beginnings with St. Irenaeus's theology. Irenaeus never used the word, "deification", but he was fond of summing up what God has done for us in Christ by saying that "God became a man so that men could become God." Other Christian writers took notice, and this little phrase, albeit with minor variations, can be glimpsed scattered throughout the writings of early Christian authors. It became so popular that scholars gave it its own name, "the formula of exchange." It was from that idea that the more well-articulated doctrine of deification emerged in later centuries.

So I wanted to pay homage to St. Irenaeus in the wake of his feast, and offer the ideas of deification and the formula of exchange up for your own prayerful reflection. They marvelously highlight the shock value of Revelation: how incredible our destiny is and how unexpected and mind-boggling it was that God

purchased that destiny for us by humbling and abasing Himself! As St. Irenaeus directly says, "Or how shall man pass into God, unless God has [first] passed into man?"

These grants are modest, ranging from \$250.00 to \$2,500.00 and often are allocated to organizations overlooked by larger charities.

If you are involved in a 501(c)3 charitable organization with a Christian philosophy and would like to have it considered for a donation, please have the organization send a letter of request to the Outreach Committee at the Parish Office. The letter of request needs to indicate a specific donation amount, and details of how the grant would be used.

As Archbishop Allen H. Vigneron stated in his November 2020 *Pastoral Note on Families of Parishes*, we are called through the intercession of Mary, the Star of Evangelization, "That the Lord may bring about an unprecedented harvest in the Archdiocese of Detroit." With the continued patronage and collaboration of our parishioners, we can continue our work gathering our resources and harvesting remarkable results. Thank you to all of St. Paul's parishioners for your generosity.




A Tradition of Support for the Holy Father

When can I register?

Registration for the 2021-2022 school year begins June 7, 2021. Class placements will take place in September.

Who can register?

All children in grades 1 - 8.

When are classes offered?

Classes will be **in person** on Mondays, beginning October 4, 2021. Class times are 4:15 - 5:30 p.m. or 6:30 - 7:45 p.m.

How do I register my child for Religious Education?

Registration is only offered on-line. If you need assistance, please contact the Religious Education Office at 313-885-7022.

How do I pay?

Payment is made at the time of registration through Faith Direct.

What is the tuition for Religious Education?

One child – \$250.00, two children – \$360.00, three children – \$425.00, four or more children – \$465.00

Is there anything else I need to register my child?

A Baptismal Certificate or Profession of Faith is required prior to receiving the Sacraments of First Reconciliation, First Holy Communion and Confirmation. If you are registering a child for 2nd, 7th or 8th grade, please provide a copy of your child's Baptismal Certificate to the Religious Education Office. If your child was baptized at St. Paul on the Lake, you can Request Sacramental Records and the Parish Office will provide a copy to our office. A Medical Release Treatment Form is required to be on file for each child enrolled in our program.

I cannot afford the fee. What should I do?

It is our desire that every child in the St. Paul parish family has access to Religious Education. If the registration fees impose a financial hardship, please contact the Religious Education Office.






