<u>Christmas Season</u>: This wonderful season of hope and joy officially ends this Monday, January 9th, the feast of the Baptism of the Lord. On Tuesday, January 10th, we return to what is called "Ordinary Time" in the Church Year. We hope that this special

season has brought you many graces and blessings. It has served to remind us that God loves us so much, He sent His only Son for our salvation. Every celebration and every tradition of this beautiful season draw their meaning from this wonderful and consoling truth that gives glory and peace to all people of good will.

Operation Care Package 2016: Many thanks to all who participated in our Care Package Drive. On November 27th, we packed boxes filled with many items for our service men and women. Thank you to all who donated money, items, or your help in packing the boxes. This shows how our parish community can pull together to do great things. FEAST OF THE EPIPHANY: Epiphany comes from a Greek word which means a manifestation or appearance. Christians celebrate the Incarnation in stages, remembering Jesus' birth in Judea on December 25th, His manifestation to the nations on the feast of the Epiphany, and His baptism celebrated this year next Sunday.

Symbols abound in today's readings: light, rich gifts, exotic visitors, a guiding star. Today's first reading (Isaiah 60:1-6) captures the wonder and joy of the Israelites who, upon their return from exile in Babylonia, are making a pilgrimage to Jerusalem. The words of Isaiah fairly trip over each other in his outburst of enthusiasm and encouragement to his people who have suffered so much.

Isaiah's description of gifts of gold and frankincense are echoed in the symbolic tokens of the wise men in Matthew's gospel (Mt. 2:1-12). Tellingly, Matthew adds myrrh, so that the mystery of Jesus' divinity, humanity, and passion are foreshadowed: gold for royalty, frankincense for divinity, myrrh for a suffering servant. Matthew's "wise men" are non-Jews, themselves symbols of the universality of Jesus' mission. Paul reminds the Ephesians of this in today's second reading (Eph. 3:2-6) when he observes that the Gentiles are "coheirs, members of the same body, and copartners in the promise."

SPECIAL <u>SAINTS' DAYS THIS WEEK</u>

<u>Monday, January 9th – Baptism of the Lord</u>
The Advent-Christmas-Epiphany season concludes with one final manifestation of the relationship of Jesus to His Father. The story of the Baptism of the Lord carries with it the announcement by God acknowledging His Son, upon whom His favor rests. In the Opening Prayer, we ask that we may be kept faithful to our own baptism, making the connection between the presence of Christ in the world and our Baptismal response.

In today's first reading from the prophet Isaiah (Is. 42:1-7) we hear one of the famous "Servant Songs" describing God's "servant" as one upon whom God's Spirit has been bestowed so that he might be a light to the nations. After His anointing by God, Jesus went around doing good works and healing all who were in the grip of the devil. In the same way, by our Baptism we are called to find out what good works need to be done and how we can heal those caught in the clutches of evil.

Friday, January 13th – St. Hilary

St. Hilary was born in the city of Poitiers (France) in 300 a.d. Because of his outstanding holiness and leadership he was chosen to be a bishop at a time when the Church was engaged in a great struggle against a heresy known as Arianism - which in effect denied the divine nature of Jesus. Hilary was a staunch defender of orthodoxy and suffered much for his fidelity to the truth of the gospel.

New Year's Resolution: One resolution we can all make is to try to participate more fully and more prayerfully in the Mass. Coming to Mass on Sunday is truly THE most important thing we do in the whole week. We should try to arrive early, spend some time in prayer before Mass then actively respond to the prayers (and in sung Mass, the hymns) of the Mass. Whenever possible there should be some time after Mass for a brief Thanksgiving. At the very least let us resolve never to arrive late for Mass or leave Mass early during 2017.

Christmastime: The "Twelve Days of Christmas" immortalized in a famous song -- are the days from December 25th to January 6th – the traditional date of the Epiphany. More recently, Epiphany is celebrated on the second Sunday after Christmas, so it has become a "moveable" feast. However, for a long time the 12 day period after Christmas was a time for special prayer, pageants, religious festivals and feasts. Part of the tradition included a formal ceremony of removing all Christmas decorations on "Twelfth Night". The popular song is often thought of as a children's song; however, some have suggested that it had its origins during the persecution of Catholics in England during the 16th century and that each day represented some aspect of the Catholic faith that it was important for all Catholics to remember - children and adults both. Thus, for example, the "10 Lords A-Leaping" referred to the 10 commandments; the "8 Maids A-Milking" recalled the Beatitudes; "the 4 Calling Birds" referenced the four gospels – and so on. Whether this is historical fact or "urban myth", the point is that this special season has a rich heritage – and many of its aspects can lead us to a fuller realization of the wonders of God's love!



Special Children's Mass: This Sunday at our 9:30 a.m. Mass, we once again welcome younger boys and girls to a special Mass where they will be excused after the Opening Prayer and go to the Church Hall for a special Liturgy of the Word.

After this Mass please join us for a Family Coffee and Craft Hour in the school cafeteria at which we will have refreshments and make crafts for the family. We are very grateful to the parent-leaders (as well as some older children) who are assisting with this program.

<u>Christmas Envelopes</u>: For anyone who did not receive a Christmas envelope in the mail, they are available at the exits of the Church and in the sacristy. Christmas is traditionally a time for giving – because we are especially aware at this holy season of everything that God has given us through His Son. Your special sacrifice at this time of year does so much to insure that St. John's will be able to meet the many needs of our people and continue to be such a special church in which to pray, to hear God's word, and to receive the sacraments. God bless you for your goodness.

Rest in Peace: Let us pray for Frances DeMaio who was buried from our church this past week. Our prayers go out to her family and friends.

<u>Traditions of Christmas</u>: All of the many customs and traditions of this wonderful season help to reinforce its message of love and joy and fellowship. We place wreaths on our front doors as a sign of victory – God's victory over sin and death. We hang mistletoe over our heads as a sign of love which triumphs over suspicion and hatred. We send cards and gifts to promote unity and charity. In some places it is customary to set the table at Christmas with an empty place setting and a chair to welcome strangers. Lights or candles are placed in windows to guide them to our home. We go from door to door singing carols to spread our joy and bring hospitality to all our neighbors.

At Christmas, the coming Christ turns winter into spring – so we banish darkness and cold with fragrant greens and brilliant flowers. Christ brings about a new creation – so we set a great tree of life in our midst and decorate it so that all creation can find rest in its branches.

Finally the coming of Christ is an invitation to a royal banquet so Christmas is our season to provide all our brothers and sisters with a harvest-rich bounty. Our eggnog toast reminds us of the Old Testament's Promised Land – a land flowing with milk and honey. The fact that Jesus has become our bread of life is celebrated at Christmas with special breads or cakes – stolen or panettone or fruitcake. Christmas is a celebration of all that is best in our humanity – a humanity which is clearly seen in Jesus as made in the likeness of God. So let us be joyful; let us celebrate; let us treasure the traditions of Christmas.
