

CANCELLATION!

On Saturday afternoon, March 14th the Archdiocese of New York announced that starting that afternoon – and <u>until further notice</u> – all Masses (Sunday and week day) and all services (including Stations of the Cross) were cancelled in every parish and every church in the Archdiocese. Churches (chapels) would remain open – for private prayer <u>only</u>. In addition any parish activities involving more than ten (10) persons were to be cancelled. All of this is part of the Archdiocesan response to the global crisis caused by the Coronavirus pandemic. In addition all classes and sports activities at Archdiocesan schools (like St. John's) are cancelled until Monday, April 20th.

PRAYERS AND PRIVATE MASSES

At St. John's the priests and deacons are praying for all our parishioners during this difficult time. Msgr. Maloney, Fr. Ulloa and our resident priest, Fr. Mathew, have been celebrating Mass daily – so that we may fulfill the intentions that our parishioners have made. Although we cannot be united physically around the altar of St. John the Baptist, our family can be joined spiritually.

PRACTICAL MATTERS

The **Weekly Collection** remains absolutely essential to our parish operations. S.J.B. ANNOUNCEMENTS March 29, 2020

<u>FIFTH SUNDAY OF LENT</u>: Lent is drawing rapidly to a close. As if to remind us of our ultimate goal, the purpose behind our prayer, fasting and acts of charity, all three readings today speak of resurrection and life beyond life.

Our first reading from the book of the prophet Ezekiel (Ez.37:12-14) comes from the conclusion of the prophet's dramatic vision of dry bones. After describing a field full of bleached, disconnected bones, Ezekiel eloquently pictures Yahweh blowing into them the breath of life, followed by the reemergence of human bodies. Then the punch line: these bones are the whole house of Israel. Utterly destroyed by the Babylonian Exile, Israel will now be restored by the spirit of Yahweh. And this promise rings down through the ages until it reaches us, the latest inheritors of the ancient covenant. When we are tempted to despair or indifference, the Lord will breathe new life into our dry bones and rekindle our hope.

Our second reading from St. Paul's letter to the Romans (Rm. 8:8-10) serves as a reminder that this new life of ours must look new. It must be a life devoted to righteousness, not sin. It must be a life dedicated to the works of justice and peace; of truth and mercy. Only then will we be worthy of the spirit within us. We are not the only ones who are aware of the looming road to Calvary. In today's gospel (Jn. 11:1-45) St. John presents us with the story of the raising of Lazarus, the final straw for those who had already had enough of Jesus, the Galilean upstart. Martha again is the active sister; she runs to meet Jesus while Mary stays in the house. Martha's simple observation that Lazarus would not have died if Jesus had come sooner elicits from Jesus first the revelation that He Himself is the resurrection and the life and then the restoration of her beloved brother. The sign is effective, many more put their faith in Jesus.

<u>SPECIAL SAINTS' DAYS – LENT WEEK FIVE</u>

Thursday, April 2nd – St. Francis of Paola

Francis was born in Calabria, Italy in 1416 and as a young man was drawn into an austere contemplative life. As his reputation for holiness grew, others joined him and he founded a congregation of hermits who dedicated themselves to prayer and simplicity of life.

Saturday, April 4th - St. Isidore

Isidore was born in Seville, Spain in 560, came from a family of saints (his brother, sister and father were all named saints!) and was a brilliant student who became a wise and learned bishop who authored an encyclopedia of religion that was used as a textbook in Europe for nine centuries.

ARCHDIOCESAN DIRECTIVES

In order to help slow the spread of COVID-19in our community, Cardinal Dolan, in collaboration with the leadership of the Archdiocese of NY and local health officials, has put the following directives in place:

- 1. The public celebration of Holy Mass is suspended pending the decision of the Cardinal and health officials.
- 2. Dispensation has been granted to all Catholics in our Archdiocese from the obligation to attend Sunday Mass. It continues until the crisis is over.
- 3. All public celebrations of the Liturgy, the Liturgy of the Hours, Exposition and Adoration, Stations of the Cross, and all other group activities are to cease.
- 4. Weddings, funerals, and baptisms will continue but will be celebrated in a simplified manner and scope at the discretion of the parish priests. Call the Parish Office for information.

PRAYER AND SACRAMENTS AT ST. JOHN'S

- 1. Although our main church is closed, our Eucharistic Chapel remains open according to the following schedule:
 - a) Monday to Friday: 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.
 - b) Saturday: 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.
 - c) Sunday: 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.
- 2. The **Sacrament of Reconciliation** is offered by appointment only. All regular schedules have been suspended. Call the Parish Office to schedule a time for Confession.
- 3. The **Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick and Holy Communion** will continue to be celebrated whenever possible with the extremely sick and the dying. Please contact the parish office if you or a loved one needs these Sacraments. They are of great importance, especially for the dying.

A QUARANTINE VIOLATION

The CDC now recommends that everyone stay at home and avoid going out as much as possible. Despite this, reports are that God is breaking quarantine and going absolutely everywhere. Hospital, nursing homes, prisons – wherever He is needed, God is going. He is reportedly visiting everyone and checking on everyone in this time of need and not using any amount of social distancing. God is said to be following the absolute best practices, though, and is at no risk of making people sick but only making people better. "We have absolutely no control over Him," said the CDC spokesman Jim Wells, "which is extremely frustrating. We want to remind you, though, that you're not God, so please stay put in small groups." God is also reportedly trying to get people to stop hoarding toilet paper and instead build up their treasures in Heaven. Treasures that don't include toilet paper.
