The Facts About Human Trafficking and Modern Day Slavery

- Human trafficking is the fastest growing criminal enterprise of the 21st century, an estimated \$150 billion industry that is second only to drugs in terms of organized crime.¹
- The U.S. Department of Labor has identified 139 goods from 75 countries made by forced and child labor.³
- California, Florida and New York are particularly vulnerable to this crime due proximity to international borders, airports and numerous ports.
- In 2016, an estimated 1 out of 6 endangered runaways reported to the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children were likely child sex trafficking victims.⁴

What You Can Do

- 1. Learn the signs of human trafficking. Know the red flags and indicators of human trafficking https://polarisproject.org/human-trafficking/recognize-signs
- 2. Be a responsible consumer! Support socially responsible, organizations that sell fair trade/slave-free goods, etc.
- 3. Become politically active! Advocate for laws that will address all forms of human trafficking.
- 4. If you or someone you know is in immediate danger, call 911 immediately.
- 5. Support/join local groups working to address human trafficking issues in your community.
