

## Vicars's Corner



This last Sunday in July I'll take a final opportunity to reflect on the devotion of the month, devotion to the Lord's Precious Blood. Pope St. John XXIII, who called Vatican II, also promulgated an encyclical encouraging devotion to the Precious Blood. Amidst all the flurry of activity at the time, I'm afraid his encyclical (called *Inde a Primis*, or, "On Promoting Devotion to the Most Precious Blood") is largely forgotten, but it's a beautiful summary of the Church's devotion to the Precious Blood.

My favorite part of the Encyclical is a quotation taken from the Church Father St. John Chrysostom. Chrysostom writes that after receiving Holy Communion, we should, "come back from that table like lions breathing out fire, thus becoming terrifying to the Devil, and remaining mindful of our Head (Christ) and of the love he has shown for us. This Blood, poured out in abundance, has washed the whole world clean. This is the price of the world; by it Christ purchased the Church." (*Inde a primis*, John XXIII, 1960) Of course, we receive the whole Christ (Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity) when we receive communion under the appearance of bread only, or under the appearance of wine, only. The Catechism of the Catholic Church reminds us, "Since Christ is sacramentally present under each of the species, communion under the species of bread alone makes it possible to receive all the fruit of Eucharistic grace. For pastoral reasons this manner of receiving communion has been legitimately established as the most common form in the Latin rite. But 'the sign of communion is more complete when given under both kinds, since in that form the sign of the Eucharistic meal appears more clearly.'" (Catechism of the Catholic Church n. 1490)

The Catechism cites "pastoral reasons" why distribution of the Host only has historically been the normal practice. These reasons involve dangers of irreverence unique to distribution of the Eucharist from the Chalice. However, if we take care, our parish family can receive the Eucharist under both forms reverently. Here's a few pointers:

- 1) Watch your mouth. Sometimes the Eucharist under the form of wine is incorrectly called "wine." No one will ever drink wine at Mass... I hope! We can, however, receive the Lord's Precious Blood. How we speak of a thing often affects how we think about a thing. Let's call things what they are, and remember that it's the Lord in the Chalice, not common wine.
- 2) Bow. No one should feel pressured to receive from the chalice, but everyone passing by the chalice, whether receiving or not, should pause and make an act of reverence to the Lord in the Eucharist, just as we would when passing by the tabernacle. During Mass, this act of reverence could take the form of a brief bow.

These external actions (how we speak and act) might seem trivial, but if we practice them together, we'll eventually internalize a more reverent attitude toward the Lord's presence in the Eucharistic Chalice.

Este último domingo de julio aprovecharé una última oportunidad para reflexionar sobre la devoción del mes, la devoción a la Preciosa Sangre del Señor. El Papa San Juan XXIII, que convocó al Concilio Vaticano II, también promulgó una encíclica animando a la devoción a la Preciosa Sangre. En medio de toda la actividad en ese momento, me temo que su encíclica (llamada *Inde a Primis*, o "Sobre la promoción de la devoción a la Preciosísima Sangre") se olvida en gran medida, pero es un hermoso resumen de la devoción de la Iglesia a la Preciosa Sangre.

Mi parte favorita de la Encíclica es una cita tomada del Padre de la Iglesia San Juan Crisóstomo. Crisóstomo escribe que después de recibir la Sagrada Comunión, debemos "regresar de esa mesa como leones que exhalan fuego, convirtiéndose así en terror para el Diablo, y permaneciendo atentos a nuestra Cabeza (Cristo) y al amor que nos ha mostrado. Esta Sangre, derramada en abundancia, ha limpiado todo el mundo. Este es el precio del mundo; por ella Cristo fundó la Iglesia." (*Inde a primis*, Juan XXIII, 1960)

Por supuesto, recibimos a Cristo completo (Cuerpo, Sangre, Alma y Divinidad) cuando comulgamos solo bajo la apariencia de pan, o solo bajo la apariencia de vino. El Catecismo de la Iglesia Católica nos recuerda: "Puesto que Cristo está sacramentalmente presente bajo cada una de las especies, sólo la comunión bajo la especie del pan permite recibir todo el fruto de la gracia eucarística. Por razones pastorales, esta manera de comulgar se ha establecido legítimamente como la forma más común en el rito latino. Pero 'el signo de la comunión es más completo cuando se da bajo las dos especies, ya que en esa forma aparece más claramente el signo de la comida eucarística'" (Catecismo de la Iglesia Católica, n. 1490).

El Catecismo cita "razones pastorales" por las que históricamente la distribución de la Hostia ha sido la práctica normal. Estas razones implican peligros de irreverencia exclusivos de la distribución de la Eucaristía del Cálice. Sin embargo, si nos cuidamos, nuestra familia parroquial puede recibir la Eucaristía bajo ambas formas con reverencia. Aquí hay algunos consejos:

1) Cuida tu boca. A veces, la Eucaristía bajo la forma de vino se llama incorrectamente "vino". Nadie nunca beberá vino en Misa... ¡Ojalá! Sin embargo, podemos recibir la Sangre Preciosa del Señor. La forma en que hablamos de una cosa a menudo afecta la forma en que pensamos sobre una cosa. Llamemos a las cosas como son, y recordemos que es el Señor en el Cálice, no vino común.

2) Reverencia. Nadie debe sentirse presionado a recibir del cálice, pero todos los que pasan por el cálice, ya sea que lo reciban o no, deben hacer una pausa y hacer un acto de reverencia al Señor en la Eucaristía, tal como lo haríamos al pasar por el sagrario. Durante la Misa, este acto de reverencia podría tomar la forma de una breve reverencia.

Estas acciones externas (cómo hablamos y actuamos) pueden parecer triviales, pero si las practicamos juntos, eventualmente interiorizaremos una actitud más reverente hacia la presencia del Señor en el Cálice Eucarístico.

### *More on Rights and Responsibilities*

Be open to learning more about the circumstances of people who are experiencing poverty. What are the burdens they carry that prevent them from accessing a fundamental right to life and those things required for human decency?

Volunteer at an agency that serves people who are poor and listen to agency leaders about the factors that affect lives. Consider your duties and responsibilities to people in those situations. A basic act may be to listen with the heart of Jesus to their story and then do one act to ease the pain.

### SAFEPARISH TRAINED VOLUNTEERS

The Archdiocese of Cincinnati, in keeping with its policies, has completed the five-year revision of the Decree on Child Protection. The revised Decree is now available for download and acknowledgment on the SafeParish website. ***Each user with a SafeParish account needs to download, acknowledge they have read, and agree to abide by the requirements of the revised Decree.*** If this is not completed within 30 days of the promulgation of the Decree by the Archbishop, the user's SafeParish account will show as pending until the user completes the acknowledgement. Users with pending SafeParish accounts are not permitted to work or volunteer with youth until they have met all the child protection requirements and their SafeParish account is approved. Please contact your parish or school safe environment coordinator with any questions.

# “Mass Moments” - Confiteor



*This is the eighth in a series of articles offering instruction on the Mass.*

Near the beginning of Mass, the community acknowledges its sinfulness and dependence on God’s mercy. One option is for all to recite the Confiteor, the prayer that begins, “I confess to almighty God.” As people admit their sin, they strike their breast.

The Confiteor is an old prayer, but its current placement in the Mass is an innovation. Prior to the Second Vatican Council, the priest recited the Confiteor by himself, one of several prayers at the foot of the altar that introduced the Mass, and the servers repeated it after him. The people prayed the Confiteor later, just before receiving Communion. This was because for many years, people did not receive Communion at Mass frequently. When they received Communion outside of Mass—for example, when they were sick—they said the Confiteor first. As Communion at Mass became more common, the Confiteor came with it. So essentially, a Communion service had been inserted into the priest’s Mass, as if the people’s Communion had nothing to do with the priest’s Communion or the sacrifice preceding it. The priest even distributed Communion from the tabernacle rather than the newly consecrated bread and wine on the altar.

In the revisions of the Mass following the Council, the Confiteor became one of three options for the Penitential Act near the beginning of Mass. The Confiteor was removed from the Communion Rite, where it interrupted the natural flow of events. It remained at the beginning, but as one option rather than an obligatory prayer. It was offered to the entire assembly to recite rather than to the priest alone. This enabled everyone to participate in the Mass from the very start as the priestly people. One way people participate consciously is to acknowledge to one another and to God that they have sinned, to say aloud, “I confess.”


