A Message from Fr. Matt ...

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

When I was a little kid, I loved Palm Sunday! I still love it, of course, but differently now. I used to love getting the blessed palm and trying (and failing) to make a cross or some other cool thing out of the palm. It usually would end up tucked behind a picture of Jesus or Mary or maybe a crucifix. There is something satisfying about getting a tangible item, something you can feel and hold in your hand. I think that one of the best parts of Catholicism, that we have stuff like this. Stuff, holy stuff, that you can feel and taste and smell and see and hear. Catholicism engages all of our senses! God made us. He knows how we work. He knows we need this kind of stuff. God is cool. So is His Church.

This Palm Sunday is different from any Palm Sunday that we can remember. I had to write this homily more than a week before today. I know things are "fluid". Man, I can't stand that word anymore. But I guess it is a good word for the situation. In any case, as I wrote I wasn't sure what things would be like on the actual day. I just knew they would probably be different. One of those great traditional tangible gifts of the Church, the palm, will be blessed at Mass on Palm Sunday, but you won't get to make crosses or hang it on holy pictures.

Not yet. The church will save it for you and some day soon, when things are better, we will give you all the palms that you could possibly want! It will be different, but it will still be great!

I saw a post recently that kind of made me mad. It was about what Jesus endured in this week. During Holy Week, we remember what Jesus went through. How He entered Jerusalem triumphantly, only to be betrayed, ridiculed and spit on by the very same people




days later. We will remember the intimacy and challenge of His Last Supper with His disciples. His prayer and tears in the garden. His trial. His walk of suffering, His courage, His agony and His death. And on Easter we will recall and proclaim His victory!

But this post that I saw took all that Jesus did this week and turned it on us. It said something to the extent that you should quit whining and complaining because what Jesus did is far more than you are enduring. It made me mad because do you know who would never say this? Jesus. Because for Jesus, this week isn't about making you feel bad or giving you perspective. No, this week isn't about that at all. This week, this Holy Week, is about one thing. Love!

When you look at this week, and enter it in ways that are strange and maybe unsettling, Jesus wants you to remember one thing. He did all of it for you! Not so that you feel bad. Not so that you stop belly-aching. Not so that you gain proper perspective on your level of suffering. He did it to love you. It is all for you.

I know that you are feeling many things this week. Loss. Worry. Doubt. Anxiety. Stress. Make sure that you save some room for love. Actually save a whole lot of room for love, because a whole lot of love is what Jesus has for you. Jesus did this so that you could be with Him forever in love. Dripping in love! Forever! So during this weird scary week, this holiest of weeks, save room for love. Wherever you are, His love will be there. His love is too big for a building so don't you worry. Just save room for His love!

The Catholic Church has a long tradition of calling on saints and praying for their intercession in sickness and difficult times. There is a whole group of saints who were called on for prayers during the plague, starting in 1348 in Munich. This group goes by the name The Fourteen Holy Helpers, each with an individual feast day and initially one day. There are churches in Germany, Italy, Austria, Hungary and other European countries named after these 14, and one parish in the Diocese of Buffalo. Twelve of this specialized group are martyrs and three are women. Perhaps most known now among them is St. Blaise, who is invoked each Feb. 3 on his feast day for blessing of the throats. These are the other 13, and what people pray to them for protection from or intercession for:

- · Achatius headaches
- · Barbara fever, sudden death
- Catherine of Alexandria sudden death
- Christopher
 - plagues, sudden death
- Cyriacus (Cyriac) temptations
- Denis (Dionysius) headaches
- <u>Erasmus (Elmo)</u> abdominal maladies
- <u>Eustachius (Eustace)</u>
 family trouble
- George
 - domestic animal protection
- Giles (Aegidius) plagues, good confession
- Margaret of Antioch safe childbirth
- <u>Pantaleone</u> physicians
- Vitus (Guy) epilepsy

Reference: Random Acts of Kindness

A random act of kindness is a nonpremeditated, inconsistent action designed to offer kindness toward the outside world. The phrase "practice random kindness and senseless acts of beauty" was written by Anne Herbert on a placemat in Sausalito, California in 1982. It was based on the phrase "random acts of violence and senseless acts of cruelty". Herbert's book Random Kindness and Senseless Acts of Beauty was published in February 1993 speaking about true stories of acts of kindness. The phrase is commonly expressed as the suggestion to "Practice random acts of kindness." There are groups around the world who are sharing acts of spontaneous kindness.
