

A Message from Fr. Matt ...

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

The Readings for this week and the life context that we hear them in, led me to one of the greatest movies of all time, *Monty Python and the Holy Grail*. If you have never seen it, you should. It is ridiculous and smart and stupid and funny. It centers loosely around King Arthur and his Knights searching for the Holy Grail. They encounter all kinds of people and situations. I know I have quoted from it before at Mass. The scene that I was reminded of was when Arthur, King of the Britons, encounters the Black Knight. This Knight is huge and scary looking. King Arthur tries to get him to join their quest but the Black Knight is silent. When the King tries to move on past him, the Black Knight says, "None shall pass." He and King Arthur square up to fight. Arthur strikes a fatal blow with his sword but the Black Knight says, "Tis but a scratch," and

"I've had worse." It is a violent scene but it is kind of cartoonish and obviously not real. It is one of the most quoted scenes in the history of movies and it still makes me laugh. So why did I think of this scene when I looked at the Readings this week? It is the optimism of the Black Knight. No matter how many limbs he loses, he still thinks he is invincible.

Now why again did I think of this scene when I prayed over the Readings for this week? I think there is a reason! In the Second Reading today, St. Peter says,

"Always be ready to give an explanation to anyone who asks you for a reason for your hope."
When Peter wrote this, it was illegal to be a Christian. In fact, for the remainder of Peter's life on earth, Christianity was illegal. Christians, and especially Peter, had a target on their back. Peter would end up being killed for being a Christian. It was not

an easy time at all and this hard time went on for years. Yet, Peter was full of HOPE. No matter how many times Peter and the Apostles were chased out of towns, beaten for their beliefs, and imprisoned, they had hope. They had the attitude, that despite what was thrown their way, kind of like the Black Knight, "Tis but a scratch!"

But they weren't exactly like the Black Knight. No, the reason for their hope was different. The Black Knight showed optimism, which means that he believed that he could face whatever came his way. Peter says, be ready to show a reason for your hope. Hope is a theological virtue that means, God can do it! Whatever they faced was "but a scratch" because there was something bigger, someone bigger, in charge. The reason for their hope was who they were in Jesus.

The First Reading from the Acts of the Apostles, speaks of Baptism and Confirmation. In fact, this Reading is considered evidence of the very first Sacrament of Confirmation. In those Sacraments we are made members of the Body of Christ and by the power of the Holy Spirit we dwell in the Holy Trinity. In the Gospel, Jesus speaks of this by saying that through the coming of the Holy Spirit, which we will celebrate in a few weeks at Pentecost, "I am in the Father and you are in Me and I in you." This is the reason for our hope!

So maybe today you aren't feeling so optimistic. That's okay. You aren't the Black Knight. It isn't all up to you. But there is reason to be hopeful. Let me say that again. It isn't all up to you. It isn't all on your shoulders, because you are not alone. You are a part of something, someone, much bigger than our current situation. Our Lord Jesus, who died on the Cross, defeating sin and death, says He is with you. Jesus who walked on water and healed the sick, says He is in you. Jesus, who rose triumphantly from the grave and ascended to God the Father's right hand and sent the Holy Spirit to console us, strengthen us and guide us, says, you are with Us!

I know things are challenging. But remember who you are. Remember whose you are. There is a reason for hope!

CHURCHES REOPEN FOR PRIVATE PRAYER

The first phase of Church reopening this weekend includes the following:

- All previous directives remain in effect.
- Churches are permitted to open for private prayer with safety guidelines in place including: seating in designated areas only, the use of masks, hand sanitizers, and social distancing with the state requirement of fewer than 25 people in attendance. Hours are posted at each location.
- Confessionals do not meet public health safety requirements, and as such, Confessions will continue to be drive thru on Wednesdays and Saturdays.
- Livestream Masses will continue.

Moving forward from this phase, the Diocese will look to return to the public celebration of the Holy Mass, with changes in place to allow for a safe experience, respectful of social distancing, and health and hygiene guidelines. More details will be released as we come closer to the next phase.

This Week's Virtue is:

Creativity

Creativity is using our imaginations and abilities to evangelize and spread the Kingdom of God.



St. Catherine of Bologna, Patron Saint of the Arts A fifteenth-century cloistered nun who lived and died in relative obscurity doesn't seem the most obvious choice to be Patron Saint of Artists. Yet a closer look at the life of St. Catherine of Bologna shows that she is indeed a saint worthy to intercede for and inspire artists. Her creative spirit, talents, visions, and struggle with doubts make her a saint even modern-day artists can relate to. She was born on Sept. 8, 1413, in Bologna, Italy to an aristocratic family. Her father, a diplomat to the Marquis of Ferrara, sent her to court when she

was 11 to be a companion to the Marquis' daughter, Princess Margarita. The city of Ferrara was becoming a cultural center, and so the young girls had an excellent education in music, literature, painting, and dancing. Catherine particularly excelled at miniature painting, Latin, and the viola.

When Margarita became engaged, she wanted Catherine to remain her companion, but Catherine felt called to the religious life. At 14, she became a Franciscan Tertiary, an order of lay women who followed the ways of St. Francis. A few years later, dissension in the community led Catherine and others to join the Poor Clares, a contemplative order founded by St. Francis and St. Clare of Assisi. In spite of her aristocratic background and education, Catherine willingly served in the more humble roles at the convent, including laundress, baker, and caretaker to the animals. Late in her life, she obediently left her beloved Ferrara monastery to form a new convent in Bologna, where she served as abbess despite her desire for a less prominent role. She continued in her artistic pursuits, playing the viola (even on her deathbed), painting religious pictures (her painting of St. Ursula hangs today in a gallery in Venice), copying out and illuminating her breviary (once belonging to Pius IX and now on display at Oxford), and writing spiritual guides and poetry.

Scholars and religious have shown a renewed interest in the guide she wrote for novices, The Seven Spiritual Weapons. One of the "weapons" she describes in that treatise might inspire Catholic artists today: in exhorting her sisters to trust in God, she tells them, "to believe that alone we will never be able to do something truly good." Throughout her life St. Catherine experienced mystical visions, which she documented in her treatise. She wrote that she had the ecstatic experience of having the baby Jesus placed in her arms by the Blessed Mother. She was also tormented by visions of the devil, but she was able to overcome these after many years of prayer.

At age 49, she became gravely ill and died a few months later. As was the custom of the Poor Clares, she was buried without a coffin. She was exhumed 18 days later after visitors noticed a sweet smell coming from her grave and some experienced miracles. Her body was found to be flexible and uncorrupted. Six hundred years later, her body remains intact. Her skin has blackened from exposure to oil lamps and soot, but still she sits, clothed in her nun's robes, on a golden throne behind a glass case in the Church of the Saint in Bologna, resplendent in death as she would never have wanted to be in life. She was canonized in 1712 and her feast day is March 9.
