A Message from Fr. Matt ...

Dear Brothers and Sisters.

In the movie "Talladega Nights," a cinematic triumph if ever there was one, the character Ricky Bobby says a prayer to "8-pound, 6-ounce, newborn infant Jesus" because he says this is the Jesus that he likes best! It is a funny scene in a funny but terrible movie. But let me tell you, that sweet baby Jesus isn't the one we see in the Readings this week.

Instead we find a God of Demanding Commandments in the First Reading. A God Crucified in the Second Reading. And a God of Destruction and Cleansing

in the Gospel. We know for sure that the God in these Readings is also the Word Made Flesh, born of the Virgin Mary, who laid in the manger, all 8-pounds and 6-ounces of Him. But while the story of the Nativity certainly is not easy, with no room in the inn and poor young parents on the run, it is certainly sweeter and gentler than what we see today. In a lot of ways, it is easier for us to love that Baby than this giver of commands and flipper of tables. But it is important to remember that they are one and the same Person. One and the same God. It got me thinking, how do we respond when Jesus isn't who we think He should be? When He doesn't answer us the way we think He should?

In the Second Reading, St. Paul talks about just this. He speaks of the Cross and Christ Crucified. The Jews see the Cross as a stumbling block because this is not the way they thought the Messiah would save them. This isn't the Messiah they expected or wanted. The Gentiles think the Cross is foolishness. It wasn't rational to them that an all-powerful God would make Himself powerless to save what He Himself created. They found it silly and it didn't fit their way of thinking. This wasn't what they thought a god would do. Do we shake our heads at them? Oh Jews, how can you not see it? Oh Gentiles, how could you be so arrogant and stuck in your philosophy? But we better be careful. If I'm honest, my reaction when things don't go the way I want them to, when God doesn't answer my prayers the way that I'm expecting; my response can be just like the Jews and Gentiles that Paul is speaking of. How about you?

When things don't go the way you want or expect them to, when things change that you were used to, when old traditions (or fish fry menus!) are adjusted, how do you respond? Do you get angry and bitter and complain and write Facebook posts about it because you know what is right and this ain't it? What I mean is, is it a stumbling block? Does it seem like foolishness? For me, and maybe for you, sometimes it sure does.

Last week, God put Abraham to the test. This whole past year, maybe God has been putting us all to the test. Maybe He is telling us through St. Paul that what we are to be as Christians, is people of the Christ Crucified. We are waiting for the sweet little baby Jesus to make us feel good in an undemanding way that involves no pain or suffering or change. But that isn't how this works. St. Paul doesn't say we preach Christ and Him sweet and non-threating. He says we preach Christ and Him Crucified.

This week, be honest with yourself about how you respond to this. There sure have been many crosses placed in our lives this year. What have they been to you? A stumbling block? Foolishness? Let's double down the rest of Lent and let Christ cleanse the temple that is in our hearts. Cleanse us of thinking we know better. Cleanse us of self concern. Cleanse us of holding onto the past just because we are comfortable there.

Jesus is doing something. He is doing something big and good. It may not be what we expect or think is right. Can you be unselfish and humble enough, patient enough, to let Jesus do what He is doing?

FRIDAYS OF LENT DAYS OF ABSTINENCE

Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence. The obligation of abstinence (refraining from eating meat) begins at age 14. The law of fasting (limiting oneself to one full meal and two lighter meals) is for individuals ages 18-59 who are without a medical condition in which fasting may be considered harmful. If you cannot fast, almsgiving is suggested. Fasting is an obligatation on Good Friday.



MAY JESUS ALWAYS BE HER LIGHT

The U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops - The "Equality" Act

TRUTH ABOUT THE "EQUALITY" ACT as only a social construct.

This Congressional bill is well-intentioned but misguided. The Equality Act discriminates against people of faith, threatens unborn life, and undermines the common good. Human dignity is central to what we believe as Catholics. Every person is made in the image of God and should be treated accordingly, with respect and compassion. That means we need to honor every person's establishments, such as church halls, to eiright to be free of unjust discrimination.

The Equality Act purports to protect people experiencing same-sex attraction or gender discordance from unjust discrimination. Although this is a worthy purpose, the Equality Act does not serve it. And instead of respecting differences in beliefs about marriage and sexuality, the Equality Act discriminates against people of faith precisely because of those beliefs. In the process, the Equality Act codifies the new ideology of "gender" in federal law, dismissing sexual difference and falsely presenting "gender"

The Equality Act:

> exempts itself from the bipartisan Religious Freedom Restoration Act, in an explicit and unprecedented departure from one of America's founding principles, infringing on religious freedom and making it more difficult for individuals to live out their faith

- > forces religiously operated spaces and ther host functions that violate their beliefs or close their doors to their communities
- > requires women in sports to compete against, and share locker rooms and shower facilities with men and boys
- > forces faith-based charities that serve all people to violate their religious beliefs, and threatens the welfare of thousands of beneficiaries of charitable services such as shelters and foster care agencies, by forcing a multitude of them to be shut down
- > ieopardizes existing prohibitions on the use of federal taxpayer funds for abortion,

likely pressuring or even mandating the performance of abortions by health care providers in violation of their consciences, and ultimately ending more human lives

> hinders quality health care, by forcing health care professionals, against their best medical judgment, to support treatments and procedures associated with "gender transition."
