THE "ANALOGY" OF FAITH

"The 'analogy of faith' might be explained by something we find in the daily newspaper. The goal of the [KenKen] puzzle is to put all the right numbers where they belong. The twist is that the numbers are determined by mathematical equations within certain areas. In other words, all of the numbers have to add up.

Our Catholic Faith is similar in the sense that all of its doctrines are interconnected and, taken together, they all 'add up.' This means, for example, that the doctrine of the Immaculate Conception teaches us something about the Eucharist. The reality of marital love reflects some truth about the Blessed Trinity. We can no more take apart pieces from our faith as we could take apart a number puzzle, and still have it make sense. God gives us the theological virtue of faith precisely to see how it all fits together, and then to live according to what has been revealed."

DEDICATION OF THE LATERAN BASILICA

"The **Lateran Basilica of Saint John** is the cathedral church for the diocese of Rome and the seat of the Bishop of Rome, the ancient and official title of the pope. As with many other places in Rome, the site of the basilica has a long and impressive history. The first Christian basilica on the spot was originally a meeting hall (the meaning 'basilica' that belonged to the Laterani family who worked for the imperial court). It was given as a gift to the Bishop of Rome by the Roman Emperor Constantine during the fourth century. Only a few decades before, Christians were still being persecuted and martyred throughout the empire. Now they had found favor with the most powerful man in the Roman Empire, who would become the first emperor to convert to Christianity. The Lateran Basilica is a symbol of this transition, from a marginal and persecuted faith community to the great Church almost synonymous with Rome today." – Sourcebook

Francisca Javier Cabrini

Madre de los Inmigrantes

13 de Noviembre



Entre el 1901 y el 1913 emigraron a Estados Unidos 4.711.000 italianos. A pesar de los innumerables dramas que suscita la emigración hay que recordar todavía hoy a una frágil maestra del S. Angelo Lodigiano, Francisca Cabrini, nacida en 1850, la menor de 13 hijos. Se distinguió, por no mirar la emigración con los ojos del político ni del sociólogo, sino con ojos humanos de mujer cristiana, mereciendo el título de madre de los emigrantes.

Huérfana de padre y de madre, Francisca hubiera querido encerrarse en un convento, pero no fue aceptada por su delicada salud. Entonces aceptó el cargo que le confió el párroco de Codogno para que ayudara en un orfanato. La joven, graduada de maestra hacía poco tiempo, hizo mucho más: reunió a algunas compañeras y formó el primer núcleo de las Hermanas Misioneras del Sagrado Corazón, orientadas por el espíritu de un intrépido misionero, San Francisco Javier. Cuando Francisca hizo los votos religiosos tomó el nombre del santo. Como él, hubiera querido partir también para China, pero cuando tuvo noticia del descuido y del drama de desesperación de los miles y miles de emigrantes italianos que descargaban en el puerto de Nueva York sin ninguna ayuda material ni espiritual, Francisca Javier no dudó un instante.

También ella, en la primera de sus 24 travesías oceánicas compartió las incomodidades e incertidumbres de sus compatriotas; pero se destacó por su extraordinaria valentía con la que afrontó las grandes necesidades que se le presentaron y supo desenvolverse para establecer un punto de encuentro y de ayuda para los emigrantes. Ante todo se preocupó por los huérfanos y los enfermos, construyendo casas, escuelas y un gran hospital en Nueva York, luego en Chicago, después en California, y así siguió extendiendo su obra en toda América, hasta Argentina. Murió durante uno de sus tantos viajes a Chicago, en 1917. Su cuerpo fue llevado a Nueva York y enterrado en la iglesia contigua a la “Mother Cabrini High School”, para que estuviera cerca de los emigrados. <http://es.catholic.net/santoral/articulo.php?id=656>

+ Remembering Our Faithful Departed +

“[During the month of November] we are called to live a particular communication with our deceased. In faith and prayer, we reestablish our family links with them; they watch us, follow after us and assist us. They already see the Lord ‘just as he is.’ So they encourage us to continue on the way, that pilgrimage which still remains to us on earth. The fact is that we ‘have no lasting city’ here. The important thing is for us not to grow weary, above all not to lose sight of the ultimate goal.

Our departed are there where we too shall be. Indeed there is common ground between us and them, which makes us neighbors. It is the ground of our mutual introduction into the Trinitarian mystery of Father, Son and Holy Spirit, on the basis of the same baptism. We here touch hands because, death does not exist on this ground; there is but a single flow of unending life.”
